ORAL MEDICINE UPDATE

William K. Bottomley, D.D.S., M.S., was Professor and Chairman of the Department of Oral Diagnosis at the Georgetown University School of Dentistry. His B.A. in Chemistry was earned at Northwestern University; his M.S. in Chemistry from Creighton University. He received his D.D.S. and his M.S. in Oral Diagnosis from the University of Michigan. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Oral Medicine and Past Member of the Board of Examiners. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology and a Fellow of the American College of Dentists. Doctor Bottomley has lectured and published extensively in the fields of Dental Radiology and Oral Medicine.

He is currently the Assistant Director of the Examination Committee of the Northeast Regional Board of Dental Examiners.

This presentation will emphasize the role of the dentist as a specialist in health care delivery. Specific cases will be discussed, which will illustrate the invaluable contribution that the dentist can make in rendering a differential diagnosis which may be essential to the total health management of the patient. The association between the clinical physical observations and the anticipated drug history will be demonstrated. The drugs most commonly prescribed for medical conditions and their significance to the dental management of the patient will be reviewed.

The diagnosis and treatment modalities of common oral conditions will be presented. The philosophy is promoted that there is a treatment for everything. The special considerations involved in treatment planning for patients with cardiovascular disease, heart prostheses, debilitating diseases, metabolic discrepancies, and organ transplants, and also for irradiated patients, will be discussed. Particular emphasis will be placed on the use of laboratory studies and radiography as adjuncts to the diagnostic process. The course will consist of lectures illustrated with slides.

DENTAL MATERIALS CHALLENGES OF THE MATURE PATIENT

Dr. Thompson is Director of Dental Materials and the Clinical Research Unit, Professor of General Dentistry, Dental School University of Maryland, and on the Clinical Staff of Johns

Hopkins Hospital. He has published many articles and made numerous presentations on dental materials in the U.S. and internationally. He has conducted extensive laboratory and clinical research on dental composites, adhesive resins, etching of alloys and bonding to tooth structure. Co-developer of the etching resin bonded retainer, Dr. Thompson has co-authored the text "Etched Cast Restorations: Clinical and Laboratory Techniques" (Quintessence) and contributed several book chapters. He recently completed his 4 year term on the ADA Council on Dental Materials, Instruments and Equipment. In 1991-1992 his program presentations include the Chicago Dental Society, The First International Adhesives in Dentistry Symposium, the American College of Prosthodontists, the American Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry and the Academy of Operative Dentistry.

From pulp to Pellicle, dental materials applications and indications are changing rapidly. This course will emphasize the latest thinking in dental materials as applied to the mature dentition. Specific materials and clinical placement techniques will be detailed in light of the new knowledge of the role of dentin smear layers and bacterial penetration on pulpal response and sensitivity. Amalgam restorations in the mature dentition and the role of liners, bases and varnishes, as well as sealing of amalgam will be updated. Included will be recommendations on composite resin selection, cavity design and placement techniques to minimize microleakage and sensitivity.

The latest treatments for root sensitivity, including precipitating solutions combined with dentin bonding agents or selected varnishes will be highlighted. The current status of dentin bonding, in light of our knowledge of the smear layer, and the bonding systems which clinical studies on abrasion/erosion lesions have shown to be the most successful will be discussed. Special emphasis will be placed on treatment of the cervical abrasion/erosion lesion. Glass ionomers and their clinical use and abuse are to be reviewed.

The status of cosmetic dentistry techniques including resin and porcelain systems will be compared for use in the geriatric patient. High strength porcelains will be reviewed, including veneers, inlays and onlays and the limitations of the all ceramic fixed prosthesis.

New adhesive systems for bonding metal and porcelain to tooth structure will be presented and a review of luting cements for crown and bridge applications. The status of bonded splints and prostheses for the senior patient is to be updated. Data on clinical and laboratory studies that contradict "Antes Law" for the periodontally compromised patient will be reviewed in light of the needs of the mature patient. The current status of CAD/CAM for production of inlays, onlays, crowns and bridges will be summarized. Adequate time for questions and answers will be provided.

THE CHANGING FACE OF DENTAL CARE: PREPARING YOUR PRACTICE FOR AN AGING POPULATION

Dr. Yellowitz is Assistant Professor and Director of Geriatric Dentistry at the University of Maryland's Dental School. She has been active in clinical treatment, research and writing about care for older adults for the past 18 years.

Dr. Yellowitz received her dental education at the University of Pennsylvania School of Dental Medicine, and has a Master of Public Health degree, with a specialty in gerontology from the University of Minnesota School of Public Health. She received a Dentist Geriatric Fellowship from the Department of Veterans Affairs and completed her training in geriatric dentistry at the Denver VA Medical Center in Colorado. Although her primary interests in oral health care are in the areas of disease prevention and health maintenance, she has also worked extensively with oral disease states, health beliefs and treatments needs of the homebound population. Dr. Yellowitz was Director of the Minnesota Pilot Dental Care Program for Senior Citizens, the first dental insurance program for senior citizens in this country. She is a Fellow of the American Dental Association, Gerontological Society of America, International Association of Dental Schools and American Association of Dental Schools. She lectures and writes regularly about many diverse issues of oral health and aging.

Mr. Dana has been an educator and consultant for more than thirty years. He joined the faculty of the University of Maryland's Dental School in 1975 to develop and teach its practice management curriculum. During the time he also authored dozens of articles and lectured to more than a hundred different dental associations, societies and study clubs and professional development courses on a variety of practice management and marketing topics. In addition, he moved from consulting for large organizations to private dental practices in such areas as practice reorganization; staff recruiting, interviewing, retention and training; developing associateships and partnerships; developing office policies and procedures manuals; strengthening practice marketing plans and patient relations including design of patient information brochures; and, stress reduction and time management. Prior to that he was Director of Professional Development at the University of Miami (FL) where he developed the conference services, non-credit and post-graduate certificate programs, taught organization development and management courses at Florida International University, and consulted for Eastern Airlines, Dade County Government and the U.S. Air Force (Patrick AFB).
