Harold L. Crossiey, D.D.S., Ph.D. STREET DRUGS: FACTS AND FALLACIES CLINICAL PHARMACOLOGY: WHAT'S HOT AND WHAT'S NOT

Harold L. Crossley, is an Associate Professor of Pharmacology at the University of Maryland Dental School, A native of Rhode Island, Dr. Crossley received a Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmacy from the University of Rhode Island in 1964. He later was awarded the Master of Science (1970) and Doctorate degrees (1972) in the area of Pharmacology. The University of Maryland Dental School in Baltimore awarded Dr. Crossley the D.D.S. degree in 1980. He is the Director of Conjoint Sciences and Pre-clinical Studies at the School of Dentistry and maintains an intramural part-time private dental practice. This liaison between the classroom and his dental practice produces a practical approach to understanding the pharmacology of drugs used in the dental office. Dr. Crossley has co-authored a number of articles dealing with a variety of topics within the field of pharmacology. Other areas of expertise include the pharmacology of street drugs and chemical dependency. He has been appointed to the Governor's Commission on Prescription Drug Abuse, serves on the Maryland State Dental Association's Well Being Committee and a University Interdisciplinary Committee for Drug Abuse Education. Drawing on this unique background, Dr. Crossley has become nationally and internationally recognized as an expert on pharmacology of street drugs and chemical dependency as well as the clinical pharmacology of dental drugs.

STREET DRUGS: FACTS AND FALLACIES

Is marijuana addicting? Is crack more addictive and/or less expensive than other forms of cocaine? Can a person become addicted to crack with one use? What's toad licking? Do I have to take any precautions with the dental patient who is under the influence? Why is it so important that my staff be knowledgeable about street drugs? The dental practitioner and staff, as health care providers have an obligation to be familiar with every aspect of a patient that will impact their dental treatment. The practitioner should be able to respond to the patient who admits to a chemical dependency and is seeking help. The active addict and the chemically dependent patient who is in recovery requires special attention. A recovering alcoholic, for example may have degenerative liver disease and should be cautioned regarding large doses of acetaminophen. The recovering heroin addict should not be prescribed an opiate for analgesia because of the increased likelihood of relapse. A patient under the influence of cocaine who inadvertently receive an intravascular injection of local anesthesia with a vasoconstrictor may experience a hypertensive crisis. Heroin "cut" with quinine may produce petechiae on the buccal mucous membranes.

These and other examples illustrate the complications that might arise when treating the chemically dependent patient.

This dynamic, hard-hitting six hour presentation will take you from the streets and into the office and help you identify the substance abuse patient. Discussion includes the origins, types, mechanisms of action, and signs and symptoms of commonly abused substances. The evolution of and a biochemical explanation for addition will also be explored.

This lecture should be attended by all dentists, spouses,

and dental team members. The topic is of vital importance to your practice, your family and society today.

CLINICAL PHARMACOLOGY: WHAT'S HOT AND WHAT'S NOT

Are the best analgesics centrally acting? Can I expect the same degree of relief from the newer NSAID's? How can I use the NSAID's more effectively? Are preservatives still in dental carpules? What if your patient is allergic to amides and esters? What's your drug of choice? What if my patient can't take amoxicillin or clindamycin for SBE prophylaxis: what are my alternatives? Do I need to give a preoperative antibiotic to a patient with an orthopedic prosthesis?

No area of oral therapeutics presents such diversity as the control of post-operative dental pain. The current medications available are discussed with a focus on the indications, contraindications and mechanisms of action. New approaches to medication-controlled discomfort such as the NSAIDS's and long acting local anesthetics will be presented in a clinically useful format.

The discussion on local anesthetics will provide the dental practitioner with some practical information on the clinical aspects of local anesthetics. They will be compared and contrasted with regard to duration of action, toxicity, antigenicity, systemic and local side effects.

Explore the traditional as well as the newer antibiotics and antifungal agents available to treat patients with oral facial infections. Indications and contraindications, SBE prophylaxis guidelines, and recommendations for the orthopedic prosthesis patient will be included in this informative presentation.

Are there any medications used in my dental office which could adversely interact with drugs the patient is taking? This discussion includes the indications, contraindications, and side effects of the ten most commonly prescribed medications for 1996. These medications represent 30% of all prescription medications taken by your dental patients. Familiarity with these drugs will provide the dental practitioner with a better appreciation for the health profile of today's dental patient.
